The facility is barrier-free and designed for ease of use, so that conferences and events can be completed on a single floor.


LOCATION





LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

Narita International Airport is about 60km from central Tokyo and is easily accessed by either the Narita Express in just 40 to 60 minutes or the new Sky Access line in 36 minutes. Haneda International Airport is even more convenient, located within 15km (15 minutes by train) from central Tokyo. Within the city, a well-developed public transportation network allows easy and convenient movement in and around the city. Major modes of transportation include trains, subways, buses, and taxis.



ACCESS WITHIN TOKYO

An extensive network of trains and subways runs through central Tokyo, offering convenient and easy commuting. The unique numbering system of the Tokyo Metro, which identifies the metro line as well as each station, makes it easy even for first-timers to know which line to get on.

In addition, the safety and cleanliness of the trains and subway cars means that visitors have no hesitation about making full use of the transportation system, even at night. Taxis run widely in Tokyo and can be hailed from the street. They also wait at cab pools or taxi ranks in front of hotels, train stations, and large buildings. Taxis are clean and comfortable, offering white-glove service and lace seat covers.

ADMINISTRATION AND COORDINATION

MANAGEMENT STRUCTURE

Based on the assignment from the JUAA President, an Organizing Committee headed by the Managing Trustee for International Affairs shall be established within the JUAA. The Committee shall be composed of a small number of members to functionally manage the Committee and shall consist of five members: the Executive Director, the Deputy Managing Director, the Director of the Evaluation Research Department, and the Director of the General Affairs Department.

The Office for International Planning will play a main role in coordinating with Tokyo Convention & Visitors Bureau, PCOs, and suppliers, etc.



STAFFING

The experienced staff of the Office for International Planning will serve as coordinators for the INQAAHE committees and secretariat and will be responsible for the administrative procedures of conference operations and for liaising with PCO.

The JUAA organizes and manages general meetings, symposiums, and various seminars every year, and we believe that we have a good track record in conference hosting. However, since this INQAAHE Conference will be an important one, we plan to manage it with the cooperation of PCO, etc. In addition, the JUAA has 30 full-time staff members, who will serve in several roles on the day of the conference.

GOVERNANCE

The Local Organizing Committee will work with INQAAHE's Event Program Committee to work towards the success of the conference.




MARKETING AND PROMOTION

Without facilitators and keynote speakers, the conference would not be successful, and the JUAA will make every effort to ensure that they are relaxed and comfortable during their stay in Tokyo during the conference.

LOCAL DELEGATES

This is a valuable opportunity for Japanese higher education stakeholders to learn about the efforts of other countries in quality assurance and to exchange opinions, and the JUAA will encourage Japanese participants to make the most of this opportunity, while considering the balance of Japanese and international attendees. In particular, we strongly encourage our full member universities to participate actively in this conference. We will also try to make use of the online system when the number of participants becomes too large.



CONTRIBUTION OF THE INQAAHE EVENT TO ENHANCING QA IN HE IN THE HOST COUNTRY

The world has changed dramatically since the pandemic of the COVID-19, and the use of digital transformation, driven by the dramatic advances in ICT and digitization, has led to discontinuous changes in various fields. The picture is similar in the educational and research activities of higher education institutions around the world. Distance education has spread rapidly, and we have learned about the advantages and disadvantages of face-to-face and online delivery. At the same time, we recognize that we face challenges in class delivery, assessment, internationalization, and campus design.

Even before the COVID-19, the international community had experienced globalization, crossborder connections in all fields, mobility of people and global competition for talent. With the emergence of Asian countries, and we are entering a different phase of the international community than in the past, which was centered on Europe and the United States. In this context, Japan, as a country with advanced issues, is expected to play a role in responding quickly to the challenges that countries around the world will face in the future, such as declining birthrates, aging populations, environmental problems, and stagnant economic conditions, and to work with other countries to create and share even better solutions by providing them with models. This means that the role of higher education institutions will be more diverse than ever before. Not only will they support the societies and economies of their countries, but they will also be responsible for solving the challenges facing the world.

On the other hand, how can quality assurance agencies contribute to the achievement of the UN Sustainable Development Goal "Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all" (4 Quality Education)? The quality assurance agencies in each country should be better developed and their activities should be carried out in line with international standards. We also need to consider how accreditation can help higher education institutions respond to changes in the social environment and pursue sustainable development.

Japan's higher education and quality assurance systems are moving through a transformational phase, and the MEXT's report of March 2021 indicates that "accreditation needs to be enhanced to become more objectivity-based and internationally acceptable."

On July 24, 2002, the JUAA held an international symposium and adopted the Tokyo Declaration. In this declaration, the JUAA clearly stated that it aims to cooperate with overseas quality assurance agencies and make international contributions within the framework of INQAAHE. We would like to continue our efforts to enhance the international acceptability of Japanese higher education institutions through advanced reforms of the evaluation system. We would also like to further collaborate with quality assurance agencies in other countries, especially in Asia region, where countries are at different stages of development, and contribute to further fostering quality culture in the region, while respecting the historical and cultural context of each country.

For these reasons, we will host INQAAHE Conference 2025 in Japan to discuss and share knowledge and ideas on quality assurance initiatives among countries, and to promote the development of higher education and quality assurance systems in the region.

[Tokyo Declaration]

It is important to enhance the international validity of the evaluations performed by the higher education quality assurance agencies of each country for promotion and development of sophisticated and diverse education and research by higher education institutions throughout the world. In addition, towards further activation of the distribution of services and goods that goes beyond national borders there is a strong need for the establishment of a system for mutual recognition between countries of higher education institutions and programs, which forms a base of international harmonization of qualifications.

International collaboration among higher education quality assurance agencies around the world will be indispensable for actively promoting efforts towards the enhancement of the international validity of evaluations and the establishment of such a system of mutual recognition among agencies.

In the European region, coupled with efforts towards the creation of a unified economic region in the form of consolidation of the European Union, studies are continuing on encouraging the establishment of quality assurance arrangements for promoting competitiveness and attractiveness of European Higher Education. "Transparency" and "Equivalence" are key words of the Bologna Declaration. The need for the establishment of higher education quality assurance systems, including mutual recognition, is growing rapidly in the Asian-Pacific region as well. The higher education quality assurance agencies of Japan are trying to work together towards establishment of a higher education quality assurance network in the region, and desire to make international contributions while obtaining understanding and cooperation from higher education quality assurance agencies of related countries.

The Japan University Accreditation Association (JUAA) is a university accreditation association that fulfills the role of assuring the quality of higher education in Japan through transversely evaluating national, public and private universities. In addition, JUAA hopes to make international contributions within the framework of the International Network for Quality Assurance Agencies in Higher Education (INQAAHE) collaborating with the quality assurance agencies in the region. At the same time, JUAA is engaged in a broad-based reform of its university accreditation system in order to enhance the international validity of Japanese universities. ABOUT THE CITY - TOKYO

CITY OVERVIEW

Tokyo, Japan's bustling capital city, is a modern, vibrant megalopolis that combines business, knowledge, creativity, and innovation. The city is the epitome of fusion, where over 400 years of Japanese history are juxtaposed with modern Tokyo, providing a unique experience for all visitors. There is something for everyone - visitors can choose from over 100,000 restaurants, including 200 Michelin-starred restaurants, enjoy one of its 80-plus parks, immerse themselves in the aesthetics of Japanese tea ceremony, or indulge in a night of unique Japanese culture at a Kabuki theatre. According to TIMES, Tokyo was selected as one of the World's 100 Greatest Places of 2021. And for the 2017 installment of its annual Quality of Life Survey, Monocle magazine ranked the livability of some of the world's largest cities according to 60 metrics, and Tokyo claimed the number one spot.

SAFEST CITY IN THE WORLD

Japan is widely known for its low violent crime rate among the 196 U.N countries, according to the survey by UNODC (United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime). The Economist, the Safe Cities Index 2021, ranks Tokyo as the fifth safest city in the world, with first place in Health Security and fifth place in Infrastructure Security. Visitors can walk on the streets and not be afraid even at night time. Many international visitors have lovely stories of returned lost wallets with everything intact. Police boxes are scattered throughout the city, at most train stations and major city intersections. Booking.com selected Tokyo as one of the cleanest cities on the globe.

Due to the high hygiene levels and exceptional all-around cleanliness, Japan coped very well with the global pandemic. The business events industry had strict guidelines to secure a safe and hygienic environment for all visitors during Covid-19.

In coexisting with COVID-19, AI robots have been introduced to maintain the city's comfortable environment. At the new Takanawa Gateway Station in south-central Tokyo, cleaning robots sweep and disinfect the floor while security robots patrol the station premises. As for hospitality, guide robots and personal mobility vehicles support visitors in transporting luggage.

SUSTAINABILITY

Tokyo is a beautiful city filled with stunning greenery. The green coverage ratio is 50.5%, and the city is advancing developments incorporating both tangible and intangible universal design.

The Tokyo Metropolitan Government continuously takes pioneering measures for further climate change mitigation and energy saving. In July 2016, the government released Tokyo's Environmental Policy, setting concrete goals for 2030 in areas including expanding renewable energy, using sustainable materials, and creating a green environment. The government also supports installing home energy management systems to reduce carbon dioxide emissions.

Regarding transportation, Tokyo ranks 1st in the world for efforts to lower transport emissions and 2nd for electric vehicle incentives (Sustainable Cities Mobility Index 2017, Arcadis). All this connects to the creation of a bright future for Tokyo.

To contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with aspiration, Tokyo is actively engaging in reducing waste and greenhouse emissions and putting great emphasis on respecting diversity. During the U20 Tokyo Mayors Summit in May 2019, the Tokyo Metropolitan Government declared a "Zero Emission Tokyo" goal to contribute to the world's net-zero emissions by 2050. To achieve this, Tokyo aims to cut greenhouse gas emissions by 50% while increasing the use of electricity generated from renewable sources to 50% by 2030. Additionally, the government has been working hard to raise public awareness of a sustainable society.

The Business Events Tokyo team at the Tokyo Convention & Visitors Bureau (TCVB) is also keen on sustainability measures. We focus on supporting meeting organizers to make events in Tokyo more sustainable. To raise awareness of the importance of sustainability in the business events industry, we published the "Sustainability Guidelines for Business Events in Tokyo" in 2019. It provides continuing education to meeting organizers and the local sector to guide how to make business events in Tokyo more sustainable.

TCVB also offers "Sustainability Experience in Tokyo" - a selection of exciting programs that integrate the SDGs perspectives with the essence of Tokyo's rich traditional culture and history and the City's environmental and social aspects. One of the exquisite programs is "Tokyo's Rooftop Honeybees." The program allows participants to visit a bee farm on the building rooftop in the Ginza district -Tokyo's most famous upscale shopping area in

central Tokyo- and learn how the tiny creatures bring honeydew from the Imperial Palace and Hamarikyu Gardens. All eleven programs were created so that visitors can enjoy Tokyo's charms and, at the same time, contribute to the future of the City.

TRACK RECORD OF CONFERENCES HELD IN TOKYO

Tokyo hosted 305 international congresses in 2019, making it the 6th most popular city in the world for association meeting organizers, according to the Union of International Associations (UIA). As Japan's capital and the center of economics, culture, and politics, Tokyo is distinctively and traditionally Japanese. Its quality of service and expertise in organizing meetings and events makes Tokyo a destination of choice for event planners.

When faced with the unprecedented challenges of COVID-19, Tokyo quickly adapted to hybrid meetings, utilizing the latest technology. While numerous hybrid conferences have been held in Tokyo, the city is already welcoming back in-person participants from overseas, ensuring safety with stringent hygiene measures.

EXPLORE ARTS AND CULTURE

Tokyo has dozens of museums spanning nearly every topic and interest. For the more contemporary-minded, there is an impressive number of smaller museums and galleries showcasing home-grown artists. Museum fans with limited time should consider visiting Ueno Park, where various first-class museums are closely located/ Among them are the Tokyo National Museum, the National Museum of Western Art, the Tokyo Metropolitan Art Museum, and the National Science Museum.

Tokyo also has 27 theaters, including the Kabuki Theater, the only theater in the world dedicated to Kabuki. Kabuki is a traditional theater performed by men in stunning makeup and gorgeous costumes accompanied by live music.

The Suntory Hall is home to Tokyo's six professional orchestras. This concert hall has been highly valued by musicians and audiences, with Maestro Herbert von Karajan calling it "a jewel box of sound."



TOKYO AT NIGHT



As dusk falls, Tokyo is transformed into a city of bright lights. Many observation decks in towers and tall buildings are open late, providing excellent vantage points for lovely night views. An evening stroll through the streets of Shinjuku, Ginza, or Shibuya – Tokyo's best-known nightlife districts – is a great way to see the city after dusk and enjoy the myriad of neon lights. The Blue Note Tokyo is the largest club in Tokyo for first-class jazz, Latin world, and soul acts. Billboard live – where musicians on their world tours converge – offers a wide range of different genres of music, from classic to jazz to pop to R&B. Visitors who want to enjoy a more local atmosphere can patronize the izakaya (local pubs) for a Japanese beer and yakitori (grilled chicken on a skewer), or enjoy their private sing-a-song party in a karaoke lounge.

Voltage Japan uses 100 Volts, different from North America (120V), central Europe (230V), and most other regions of the world. Japanese electrical plugs

have two non-polarized pins.

Currency

The currency of Japan is written 円 in Japanese. Its currency sign is ¥ and is written "Yen" or "JPY" in foreign characters.



The consumption tax in Japan is 10%. There are six coins (1, 5, 10, 50, 100 and 500 yen) and four banknotes (1,000, 2,000, 5,000 and 10,000 yen). Foreign currency can be exchanged at exchange counters, banks, and hotels. Banks are open Monday to Friday, 9:00 am to 3:00 pm.

Time zone

Japan Standard Time (JST) is 9 hours ahead of Coordinated Universal Time (UTC). This time zone is in use during standard time in Asia.



Smoking

In Tokyo, smoking is banned in most public spaces, taxis, and public transport. Smoking is only allowed in designated areas.

Car rental

An International Driver's License is necessary for delegates who wish to rent a



car, as foreign driver's licenses are not accepted.



Tipping

Tipping is not expected in Japan, but delegates may wish to tip for special services or kindness.

Emergency services

The emergency phone number for the police is 110. The emergency phone number for fire and ambulance services is 119.



Tap water

Tap water is drinkable and very safe. The national water infrastructure is reliable, and ion facilities are well maintained

purification facilities are well maintained.

Suica / Pasmo card

Smart cards "Suica" and "Pasmo" can be used on almost all rail and bus lines in the Tokyo metropolitan area and are also accepted by

many taxis. "Suica" IC cards are available at JR stations, while "Pasmo" cards are available at subway, private railway stations, or bus depots. You can

also use these cards for shopping with electronic money at an increasing number of registered shops.
