To be a prominent voice and champion in higher education to leverage accreditation for our member institutions and students.



Globalization of Middle States Institutions

- 17% of MSCHE institutions have one or more international locations.
- 111 MSCHE member institutions have operated 745 international locations in 91 countries.
 - 30 Main Campuses
 - 45 Branch Campuses, and
 - 670 Additional Locations.
- Characteristics of the 86 institutions that have multiple (1 to 8) international locations:
 - Average total enrollment of 14,689
 - 26 public, 58 private non-profit, 1 private for-profit
- MSCHE also accredits 18 international institutions located outside the U.S.



MSCHE's Approach to Quality Assurance: Compliance and Continuous Improvement

- Telling the institutional story through the lens of its institutional **mission** and providing related evidence.
- Mission and Strategic Institutional Priorities should be in the forefront of the accreditation process.
- In addition to compliance, continuous Improvement through peer review is the focus and driven by peer evaluators.
- Institutional accreditation review process is inclusive and collaborative.
- Role of Primary Stakeholders: Engage in accreditation process, stay informed, provide feedback, participate in the process, and celebrate institutional successes.
